Notice of Intent to Deny the Application for a 2026 Type III Instant Bingo License

- A. For purposes of this Notice: the terms “you” or “your” shall refer to “The Gloria Barcalow Charitable Foundation” and specific terms contained herein shall have the same meaning as defined and set forth in the provisions of Chapter 2915 of the Revised Code and Agency 109:1 of the Administrative Code.
- B. Rule 109:1-4-02 of the Administrative Code imposes upon an applicant for a license under Chapter 2915. of the Revised Code and Agency 109:1 of the Administrative Code “the burden of demonstrating to the attorney general, by clear and convincing evidence, that the applicant is eligible, qualified, and suitable to be granted and retain the license or endorsement for which application is made under the applicable standards and requirements of Chapter 2915. of the Revised Code and Agency 109:1 of the Administrative Code.”
- C. The Ohio Attorney General’s Office hereby informs you that you have not met your burden of establishing by clear and convincing evidence your eligibility, qualification and suitability for bingo licensure. Therefore, pursuant to Chapter 2915 of the Ohio Revised Code and agency 109:1 of the Administrative Code, the Attorney General intends to deny your 2026 Type III Instant Bingo License Application (“Application”) based on the following circumstances:
 1. Question 11 of the Application asks: “Are you actively registered as a non-profit with the Ohio Secretary of State?” You responded: “Yes.” However, the Ohio Secretary of State’s records do not show that you are registered as a non-profit corporation. Instead, its records show that the “Gloria Barcalow Charitable Foundation” is registered only as a “Fictitious Name.”
 2. Question 13 of the Application asks: “Has the organization ever had a bingo application rejected by the State of Ohio?” You responded: “No.” However, on September 9, 2025, you submitted an application for a Type III Instant Bingo License. The Ohio Attorney General denied that application with an Adjudication Order issued on November 26, 2025, which was served on you on December 6, 2025.
 3. Question 15 of the Application asks: “Is your organization in compliance with its charitable registration and filing requirements?” You responded: “Yes.” However,

the registration records of the Ohio Attorney General's Charitable Law Section show that you are past due for filing your 2024 Annual Report.

4. You registered with Charitable Law Section with the Employer Identification Number ("EIN") of 34-1051037. Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") records show that EIN registered to a Golden Nugget, Inc. The Golden Nugget, Inc. is registered with the Ohio Secretary of State as a for-profit corporation. Additionally, you registered with the Charitable Law Section as doing business as "Wilson Funeral Home." The Ohio Secretary of State's records show the "Howard H. Wilson Funeral Home" in Bridgeport, Ohio registered as a for-profit corporation.
5. You provided on your Application the address of 228 Main Street, Bridgeport, Ohio 43912 as the location where you intend to conduct bingo. The Application asks: "Does your organization own or lease this location?" You responded: "Own." However, the Belmont County Auditor's property records show that 218 & 228 Main Street, LLC owns that property.
6. The Ohio Attorney General's Office requested information from you verifying charitable programming and your status as a charitable organization. To date, you have not provided the information our Office requested.

D. In view of the foregoing, the Attorney General's Office intends to deny your 2026 Type III Instant Bingo License Application because you have not met your burden of demonstrating to the Attorney General, by clear and convincing evidence, that you are eligible, qualified, and suitable to be granted a license under the applicable standards and requirements of Chapter 2915. of the Revised Code and agency 109:1 of the Administrative Code and based on the following reasons:

1. Revised Code Section 2915.08 authorizes the Attorney General to issue bingo licenses only to those entities that qualify as a "charitable organization" as that term is defined in Revised Code Section 2915.01(H). Section 2915.01(H) of the Revised Code defines a "charitable organization" to include only those organizations that are "exempt from federal income taxation" under the Internal Revenue Code. Furthermore, pursuant to Revised Section 2915.01(H), to qualify as a "charitable organization," an organization shall have been in continuous existence as such in this state for a period of two years immediately preceding the making of an application for a bingo license under section 2915.08. In violation of these provisions, the Gloria Barcalow Charitable Foundation failed to demonstrate that it:
 - a. is a non-profit corporation rather than merely a fictitious name for a for-profit entity, whether the Howard H. Wilson Funeral Home, Inc. or the Golden Nugget, Inc.;
 - b. has been in continuous existence as a "charitable organization" for the immediate two years preceding the submission of your Application.

Therefore, you do not qualify as a “charitable organization” eligible to obtain a bingo license from the Attorney General’s Office.

2. Revised Code Section 2915.08(F)(2)(b) authorizes the Attorney General to refuse to grant a license to an organization that “makes or has made an incorrect or false statement that is material to the granting of the license in an application filed under this section.” In violation of Revised Code Section 2915.08(F)(2)(b) you falsely stated that:
 - a. the Gloria Barcalow Charitable Foundation is actively registered as a non-profit with the Ohio Secretary of State, when it is not registered as a non-profit corporation, but only as a “Fictitious Name;”
 - b. you never had a bingo application rejected by the State of Ohio, when the Ohio Attorney General denied your 2025 Type III Instant Bingo License Application by Adjudication Order issued on November 26, 2025, which was served on you on December 6, 2025;
 - c. you are in compliance with charitable registration and filing requirements, when the registration records of the Ohio Attorney General’s Charitable Law Section show that you are past due for filing your 2024 Annual Report;
 - d. you own the 228 Main Street, Bridgeport, Ohio 43912 location where you stated you intend to conduct bingo, when a limited liability company known as 218 & 228 Main Street, LLC actually owns those premises;

Such statements are material to the determination of whether to grant the license requested in your Application filed under Section 2915.08 of the Revised Code, particularly as to whether you qualify as a “charitable organization” eligible to have a bingo license issued to it.

3. The Administrative Code 109:1-4-02 requires applicants and licensees to provide any information requested by the attorney general relating to licensing, endorsement or regulation; cooperate with the attorney general in investigations, hearings, and enforcement and disciplinary actions; and comply with all conditions, restrictions, requirements, orders, and rulings of the attorney general in accordance with the Ohio Revised Code and this chapter. In violation of Rule 109:1-4-02, you failed to provide the Attorney General’s Office with information it requested from you verifying charitable programming and your status as a charitable organization.
4. Revised Code Section 2915.08(F)(2)(e) authorizes the Attorney General to deny a bingo license if it “has good cause to believe that the organization will not conduct bingo in accordance with sections [2915.07](#) to [2915.15](#) of the Revised Code or with any rule adopted by the attorney general pursuant to this chapter.” In view of the foregoing circumstances, the Attorney General has good cause to believe that the

you will not conduct bingo in accordance with sections [2915.07](#) to [2915.15](#) of the Revised Code or with any rule it has adopted.

Pursuant to Section 119.07 of the Revised Code, you are entitled to a hearing on this matter if you timely request one. If you wish to request a hearing, the Attorney General's Office must receive the request from you within 30 days of the date you are served with this notice. In the event you timely request a hearing, you may appear in person and represent yourself or be represented by an attorney that is permitted to practice law in the State of Ohio.* At the hearing, you may present evidence and examine witnesses appearing for and against you. In lieu of attending the hearing, you may also present your position, arguments, or contentions in writing. At all times, you have the burden of demonstrating to the attorney general, by clear and convincing evidence, that you are eligible, qualified, and suitable for licensure under Chapter 2915 of the Revised Code and Agency 109:1 of the Administrative Code.

***Be advised that, under Ohio law, corporations must be represented by an attorney authorized to practice law in this State and that individuals not so authorized may not appear and represent those entities. If you have any questions regarding your status, you should contact an attorney for further guidance.**
