## Here's what you need to know:

- Charitable U. consists of a series of short webinars and other vital resources for effective leadership. And it's free.
- Webinars cover four topics: board governance, financial operations and internal controls, filings and recordkeeping, and fundraising.
- Charitable leaders who fulfill the training requirements will have their name and organization listed on the Attorney General's Charitable U. webpage.
  Additionally, they will receive a completion certificate that can be shared with funders to illustrate their organization's commitment to sound governance.
- Because laws and best practices continue to evolve, certificates expire after three years; the training must then be retaken.
- Starting in 2023, nonprofits that apply for grants from the Ohio Attorney General's Office are required to complete Charitable U.

## So how do you enroll?

Students need to register at charitable.ohioago.gov/ Charitable-University, at which time training materials will be made available.
